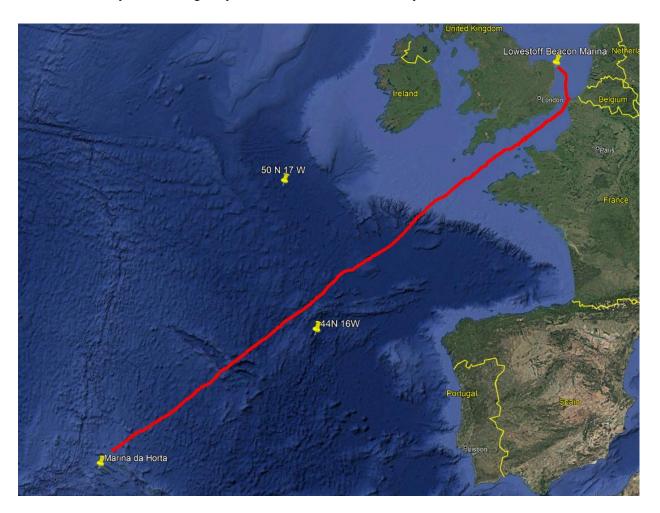


US S/V Clio Bayfield sailing July 2025 Greifswald, Germany to Lowestoft, UK 500 nm.



Planning the next leg of the voyage from Lowestoft UK to the Azores. It's a 1500 nm and if we are lucky can traverse the English Channel with favorable winds we'll get back out into the Atlantic for the 1000nm to Horta. Studying the historic wind now. Hoping the jet stream stays away from opposing us.

We carry 8-2 gallon polypropylene tanks strapped down on the lazarette shelves and one 5 gal next to the Through-Hulls. Thinking of getting another 5 gal.

You get the picture, lots of motoring. 294 nm from Brunsbüttel, Germany to Lowestoft, UK only 4 hours under sail in four days, three overnights. But the three day weather window was calm for motoring! You can be laid up for weeks waiting since the prevailing winds are strong from the SW driven by the jet stream above the English Channel.

Thinking the internal tank holds 20 gals.

7 nm per gallon! I think in calm water we could get 12 nm per gallon. We made it with three gallons left with a 30 Yanmar.

I must have been nuts to set off but I thought it was fine.

We booked tickets home as soon as we landed. There was the perfect weather window to motor to Dartmouth in another three days after gassing up at Lowestoft, UK.

We never made it to Dartmouth. Will stop there on the way out of the English Channel.

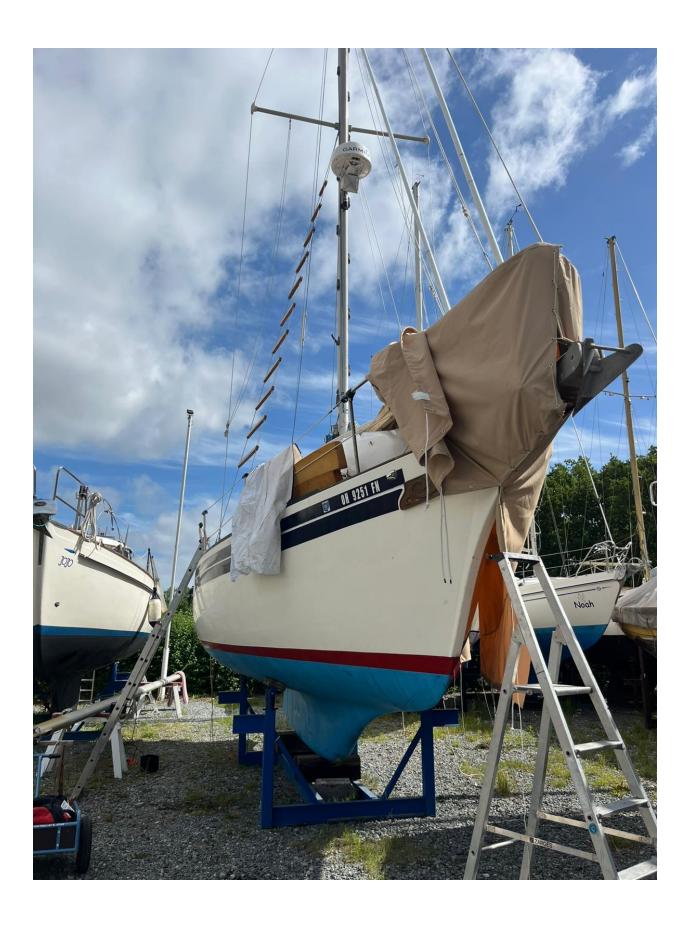
Marine Traffic shows real time AIS location if we are motoring. If we're sailing we turn it on for 5 minutes on the hour.

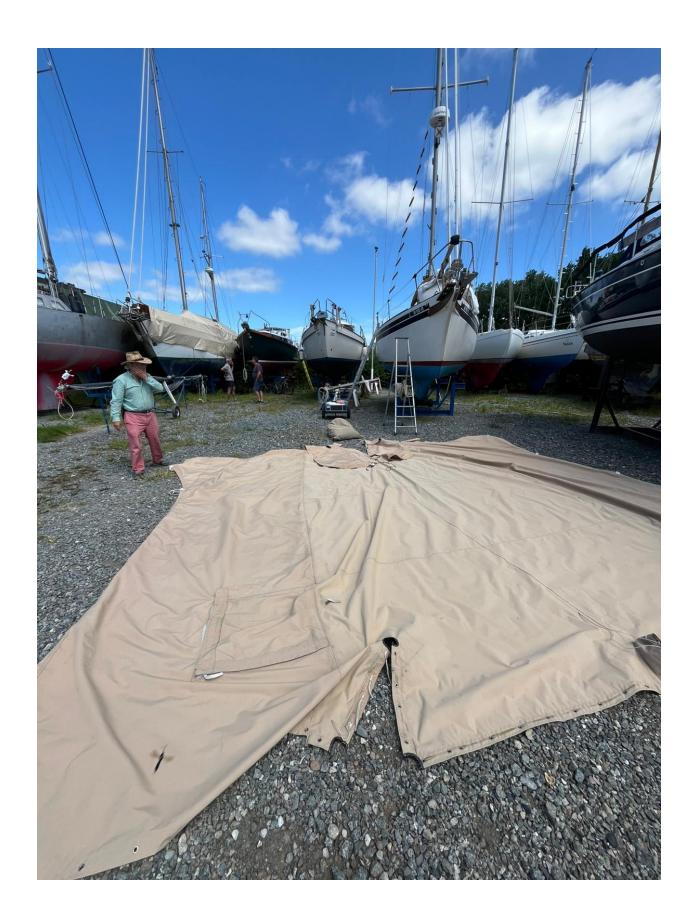


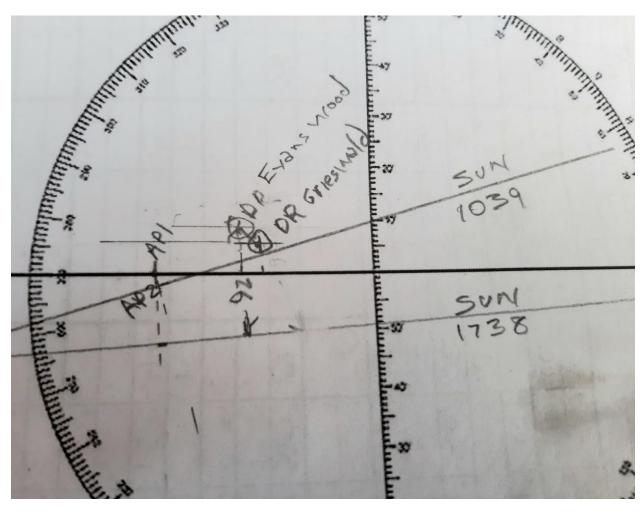


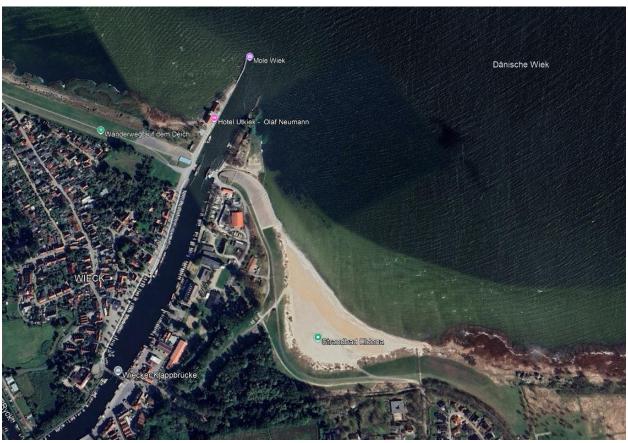














Our thatched roof hovel 1 block from ships on the Rych River, focus in on the right.

Always scary but thinking through scenarios helps. Still fanbergasted the converter works after being exposed to the elements. Never again will I leave anything outside that's important.

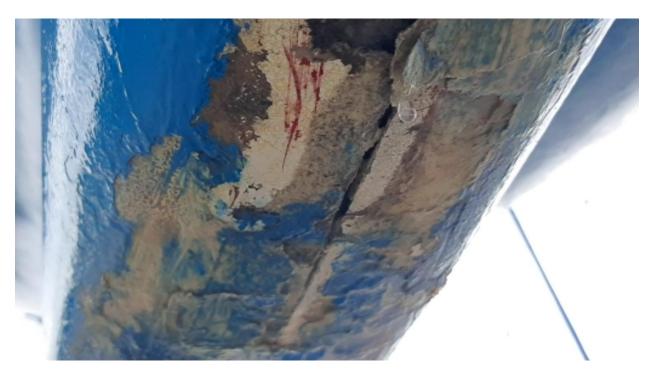
Adapted caulking gun syringe worked perfectly. I bought a blank one years ago just to be sure and sure it was. Even able to reuse! Big gap in the hull where rocks hit it. A 1/8" seam needs to be filled with G Flex. Lot of heavy fiberglass left and perfect for patching the most vulnerable part of the hull. Lengthy dripping here after bring pulled out last year. Patch should put the kibosh on that!

Fixing That Leaky Hull

After hitting a rock, cutely, we took a long look at the split in the bow. It looked like the Bayfield was molded in two halves and glued together. It must have leaked two gallons. Back in the yard we patched the area after grinding out a lot of loose fiberglass. Applying a double layer of heavy fiberglass blanket, the leak we'd experienced for years went away.

Hull patch complete. Though we ran aground off Dirami, we never worked on this part of the boat even after groundings on Lake Erie. Water would drip for hours once out of the water. Not any more. Lots of grinding, and inhaling fiberglass though I did grind up wind. My nostrils have been running but I think it's coming to an end. Use most of the very heavy ½" matt fiberglass in a patch work from all the leftover pieces from making the engine rails. G-Flex, West System eeH8sAAOSw4Apecocupoxy, started the layup because it's the strongest bond between old and new, then West System Epoxy with filler to lay up the second layer. It'll be interesting to see if the bilge becomes dry!

Finished painting the hull.

Blew out the converter by cutting a live ac line for the old Frig. Captain Tom has been taken down several notches. Luckily the fuse blew and we were able to buy 2 replacements. Got the AIS working by remembering to also turn on the GND10!

Turning in the car today. Got the hovel for two more days. Inside Clio things are getting stowed and the enclosure will go up giving lots more room for moving around.

Filled 8- 2 gal and 1- 5 gal polypropylene fuel tanks.

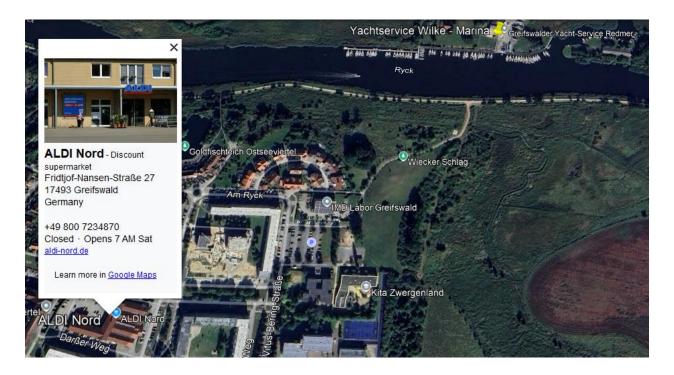
#### Safety First!

## Saturday, July 5, 2025

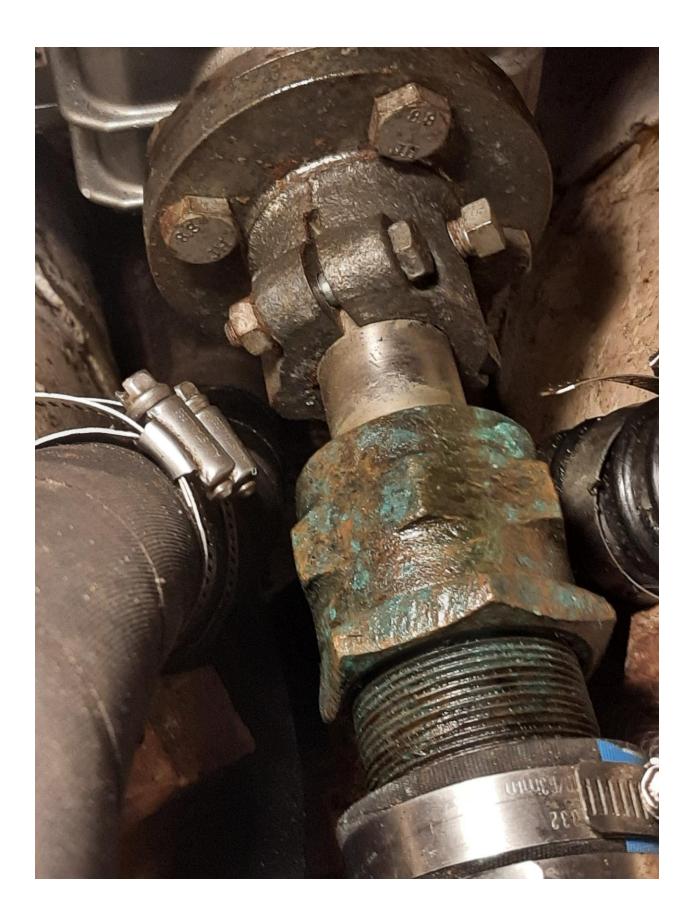
Frig is working! Had all the fittings needed! It's about half the size of the old one. A perfect retro-fit. Thank God we bought the small extra pack of connectors. After blowing the fuse on the converter, we constantly covered each other as we did the install. It's half the size and running well off the new house battery. Thank you, thank you, thank you.

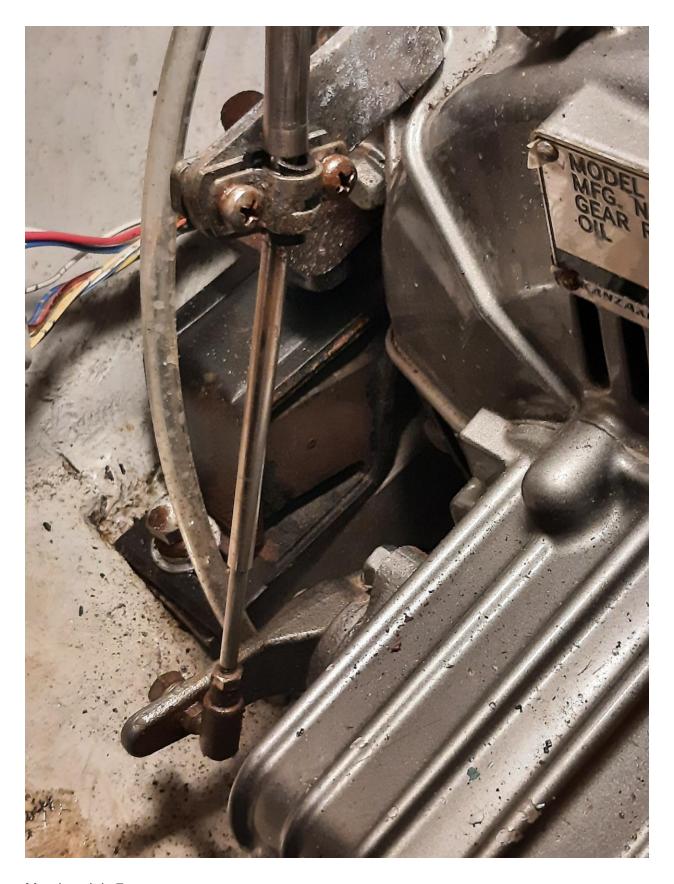
Walked into the little village of Wieck, across the bridge, then back along the River Ryck to the Aldi's about two miles we hiked with backpacks. On Monday, we go in the water then use the two free bikes in the yard to go back for perishables.

#### Sunday, July 6, 2025

Here, everyday seems like we'll never get underway but we do move the ball down the road everyday. Sunday, is a break day, for a few minutes. Will prepare the self steering servo pendulum today for it cannot be installed while Clio is in the water. Spent the first night in my little 18" bunk, very comfortable like a cocoon.

We put into the water today and immediately had to tighten the stuffing box. Probably loosened because the shifter cable holder loosened up and made the shaft turn when we started the engine on the hard in gear! Bending sail now and off we go tomorrow for Dartmouth. Nobody told us the winds in the North Sea and Channel are always SW in July:(





Monday, July 7
Boat put in. Tightened stuffing box. Bending sails, shopping for leaving for the Keil Canal. Could make it in three days not stopping.

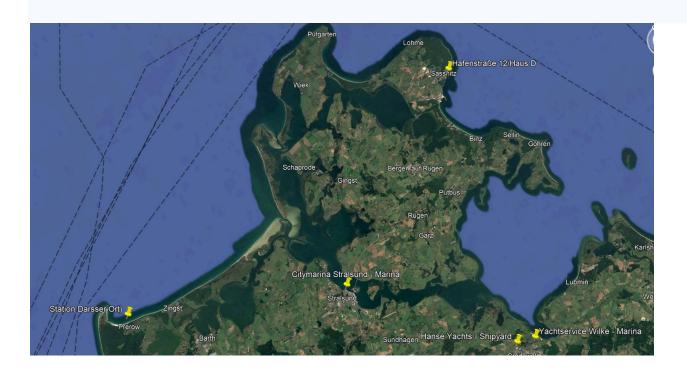
Early turn and early wake up.

Nervous, careful, diligent, apprehensive, cautious and safety first make up the final preparations for disembarking.

Tied down dinghy & solar panel, filled up water, tightening back stay, updated chart plotter, made route, verified systems are updated, turned on InReach (it'll be on for the rest of the voyage.)

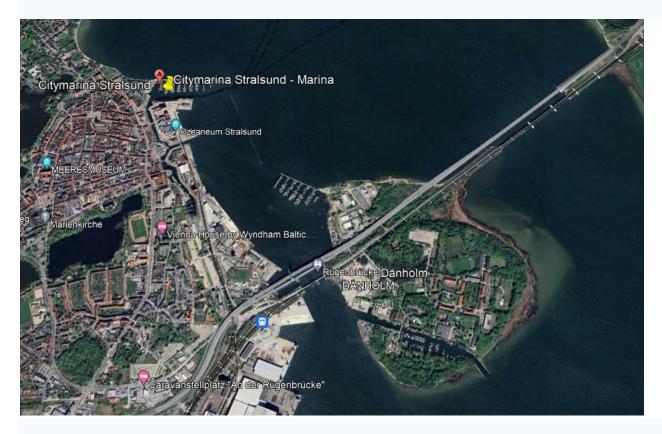


The little town at the entrance of the Ryck River. Waiting for the bridge to open.

Finally sailing at 8:45 then again motoring st 12pm. Sea state calm enough for a straight course to our next island cut through 65nm away.

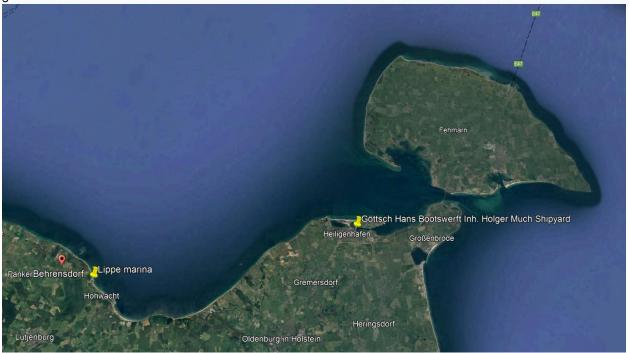


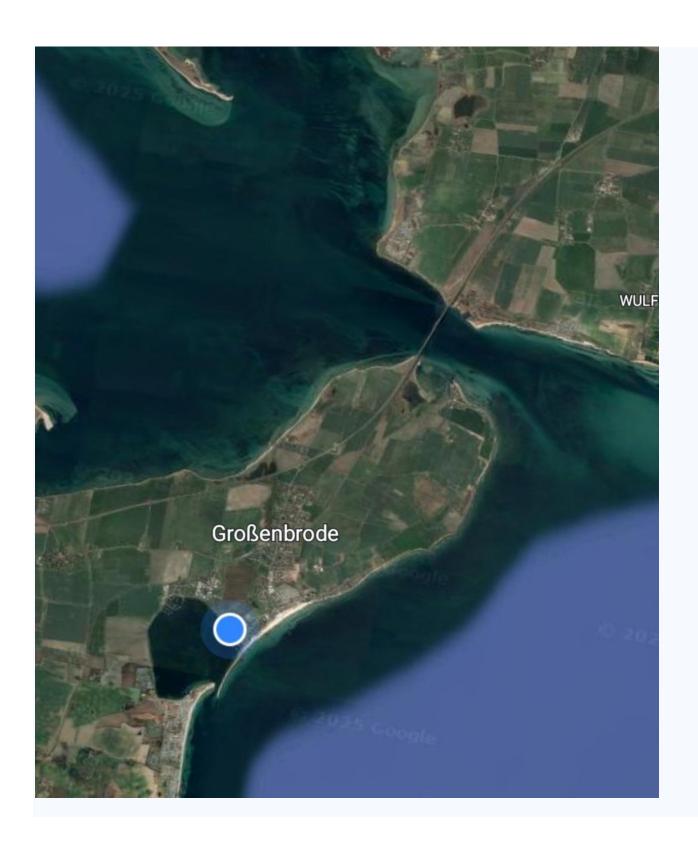
The wind died and we started the engine to a rising full moon. Willard took the midnight to 4 watch and I did the 4 to 8. We activated the auto pilot but not before Willard and John did a full watch holding the helm.

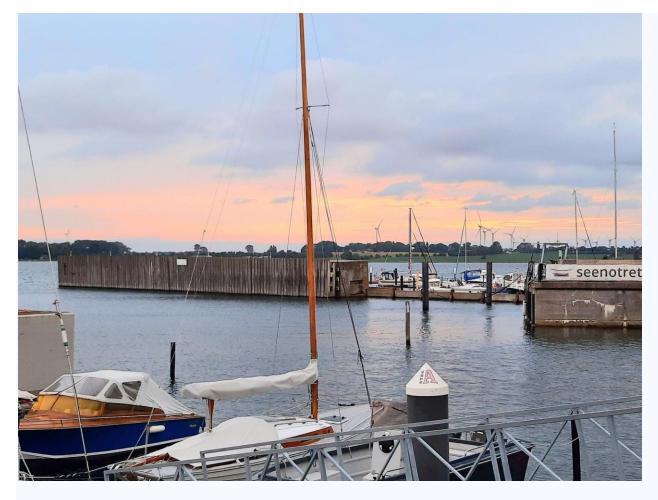
Wednesday. July 8

I did the 4 to 8 watch with the autopilot running the engine.

John took over the 8 to noon watch but head winds steadily picked up slowing us down to a crawl making using the auto pilot no good.







#### GroBenbrode, Germany

Contrary winds made us decide to put onto a cute harbor before the island cut through. But not before I took a sighting and got to within 10 nm! Then the Garmin chart plotter, AIS, depth finder and wind indicator died, very unusual and incredibly expensive. Luckily we had Navionics on our tablets and was able to navigate into a berth without a depth finder. Now we're trying to troubleshoot this massive problem.

The problem was the house battery went to 0. The starter battery maybe was okay. Working on it tomorrow. Thinking the main switch is faulty. We were running the engine with batteries on all.

Hope we discover the problem. Connections on the battery switch need cleaning. Voltage to the house battery was 12V and needs to be at least 13.

Also the solar panel was disconnected. Boy, what dropping of the ball.

What difficulty and freedom. What seems the end quickly becomes doable.



Thursday, July 10

Left the GroBenbrode harbor at 2 pm going through the cut between the island and under a high bridge.

I witnessed the rising full moon while John had an easy watch from 8 to midnight with a calm sea, clear sky and rising full moon with the auto pilot. Willard took over at midnight with the sea state rising where he had to disconnect the auto pilot and hand steer his 4 hour watch to 4am.

I came on at 4 am to a setting full moon.

Everything was turned off since the engine alternator was not working. Using the tablet running navionics and turning on the chartplotter 5 minutes on the hour.





Pulled into the waiting dock for the Kiel Canal Lock at 6am.

Landed at Kiel-Holtenau marina at 6am.

We took a chance to turn off the engine. The batteries were dead. The engine runs by itself.

After a brief nap, we started working and now have the alternator out of the boat going to the marine shop to get a new one and a marine starter battery. We'll parallel the two standard batteries to make the house battery system.

We worked the problem till we got exhausted. Discovered 13.6 V coming from the alternator. We think we have a diode or voltage regulator problem. We will see. After taking an Uber to replace the alternator, which did not fit, we rented a car but discovered we did not need it. We called it quits and enjoyed a nice evening in Kiel. Tomorrow we motor to a marina with experts and wifi. Hoping to Crack this nut.

# Saturday, July 12

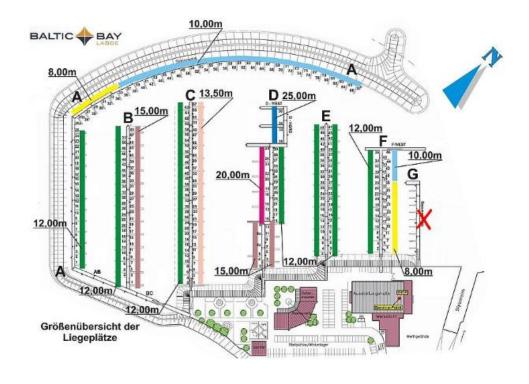
Willard got up early and did some grocery shopping. Emailed Laboe Marina.

# Sunday, July 14

Thanks to the charger manual and Internet access we changed the battery setting from lithium to AGM. All readings look good. It was expensive buying a new starter battery. Rather pay for renting a car and taking Ubers than paying 100 Euros an hour for specialists at the marina.

Forgot to tie up the servo pendulum while not in use. It swung to the starboard and almost came off. It has a lifeline! Will tighten up bungee while here since the stern is against the dock making it easy to do. Won't have to get into the immersion suit.

We solved our electrical problem by moving to a marina with wifi! It's great to have three heads working the problem.

We were able to change the battery selection to ADM, which is what they are and now they are 83% charged using a TBD-SmartShunt.

Our big question is: did we hurt the Yanmar 120 amp alternator?

Luckily Laboe Marina is a Yanmar dealer, and we'll probably get a new alternator tomorrow.

Now to cross the North Sea or motor sailing though the vast Netherlands canals. Will get the guide book before leaving. Things are looking up. Thanks to the internet and three brains.



Monday, July 14 Laboe, Germany

In the distance is the fancy Italian Restaurant, Marina office and ship's services where we got good advice.

The specialists came over and gave us lots of good advice and declared the alternator good. We just have to straighten out the wiring. Will be spending the next two days learning everything about our simple system while we wait for a part they recommended.

We walked into town to buy groceries.

I stay around the boat most of the time. This wiring thing is the last thing we had to learn. I have three threads going on Facebook groups querying for information. Everyone is so kind. I make up images in PhotoShop and post them to get verification. I suppose the same thing would happen if I was on Mars. We never mastered the wiring system; just made it work and work it did! Now there is another level of expertise. This new part we ordered will get rid of the big red switch, the one that changes from battery one to two. Experts are so kind to help. We hope they get paid by the company whose products they represent.

We hang out in the cockpit at the turn of the docks with everyone saying, "Moin." Many stop to hear about Clio's voyage.

## What does moin mean?

German knows many greetings, and many have their own interesting origin story. Moin simply means "hello", and it is used mostly informally, but it wouldn't be weird to hear it in more formal settings, too. It is that widespread! Moin is common in the northwest of Germany.

We got hooked on Greg Brown, singer poet. Willard turned him on to us. We played his YouTube late into the night. Our other stations WOBO out of Batavia, Ohio, John's favorite station, old country. Mine are WVXU NPR out of Cincinnati and Album 88 out of Atlantic. We play them all on Radio Garden a web app. They sound great on the JPL speaker the excursion boat company gave me for Christmas.



The **U-Boot-Ehrenmal Möltenort** (Möltenort U-Boat Memorial) in Heikendorf near Kiel is a memorial site belonging to the German War Graves Commission, commemorating the sailors who died serving in U-Boat units during the First and Second World Wars, along with all victims of submarine warfare. The memorial also honours U-Boat sailors from the Bundeswehr who have been killed in service since. The memorial site is an emblem of Heikendorf.

Definitive Wiring diagram created after three days of study. Was verified by an expert boating friend. Hope to install and leave tomorrow.

Feeling a lot better. We had a fine dinner at the Italian restaurant part of the marina. John has been hanging out there in the evening.

There is no comparison to what this voyage is like. Being able to fix everything is key. This electrical problem is one of the last things we had to wrap our heads around though we did get this far!

The trip is coming together. So many systems have to work. Our last hurdle was electrical, next hurdle: weather!

Tom, Willard and John here. We enjoyed visiting your fine craft. I could kick myself for not having you look at our electrical problem. We are here tomorrow Wednesday waiting for a recommended part from the yard but would like to have you stop by to help. We've been studying everything about our problem. We made it 4744nm so far so it can't be so much of a problem.



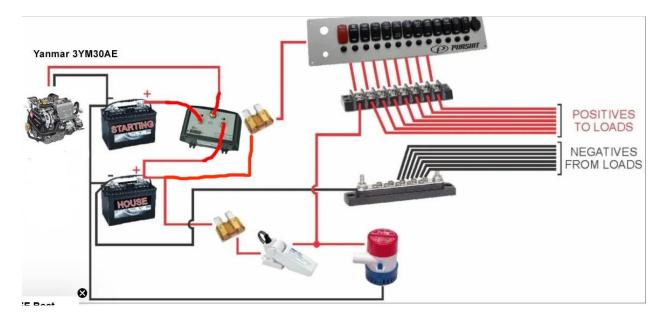

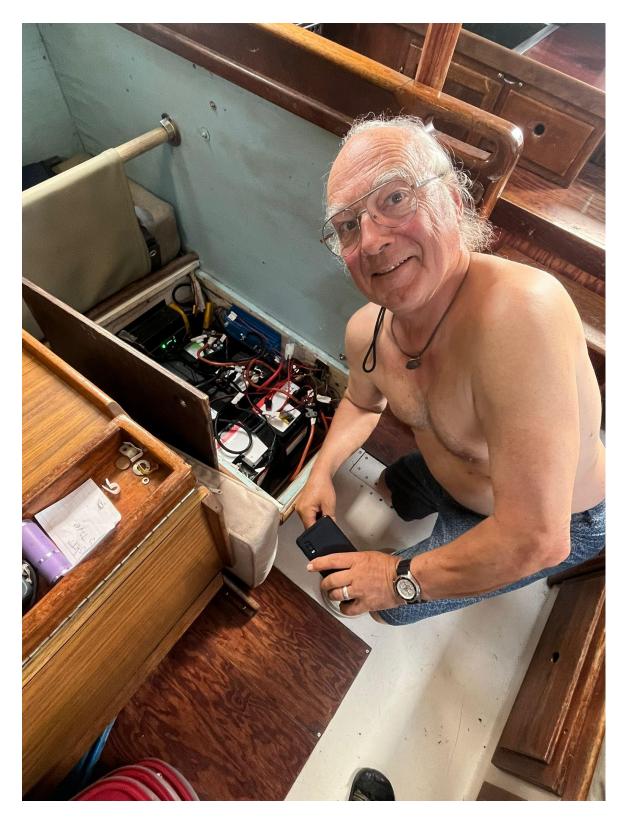
Claire and her dad, who teaches history at the German officers college in Hamburg, is a colleague of Willard's. Eight year old Claire mostly speaks to her parents and brother.

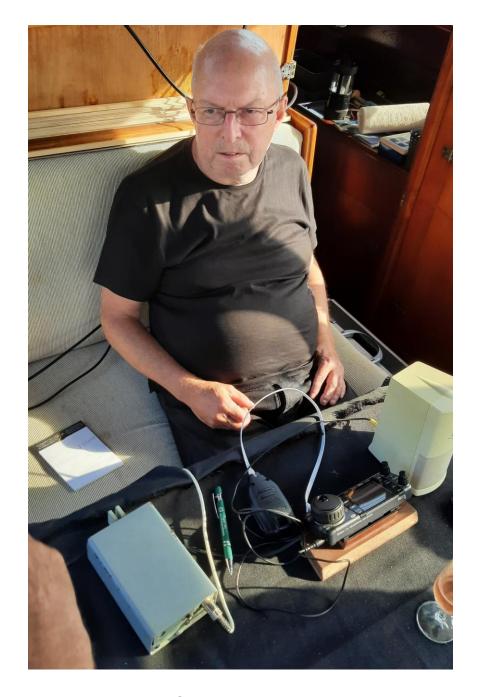

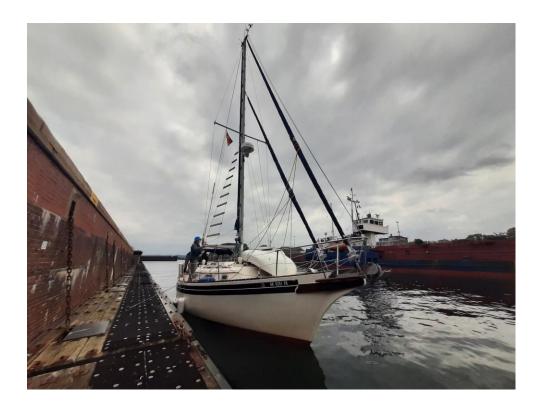

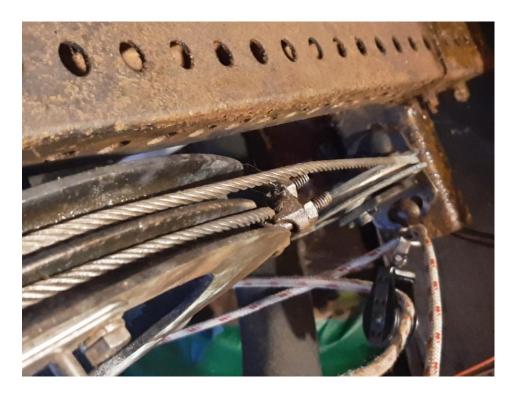

Saturday, July 19

Left Germany with a calm sea motoring. Winds too light to sail. Out of the Elbe River cruising alongside the Fuchsian Islands half Germany half Netherlands. Swell from the northeast caused by the light NE winds. 240 nm to Lowestoft UK. Rigged red cabin lights and fresh batteries for the flashlights but the biggest hurtle was replacing the broken end of the whisker pole. Broken by stressing it too much hoisting the dinghy. By good chance we had another in the boat house. Fitting it was a pleasure since we have all the tools and parts needed.

## Sunday, July 19

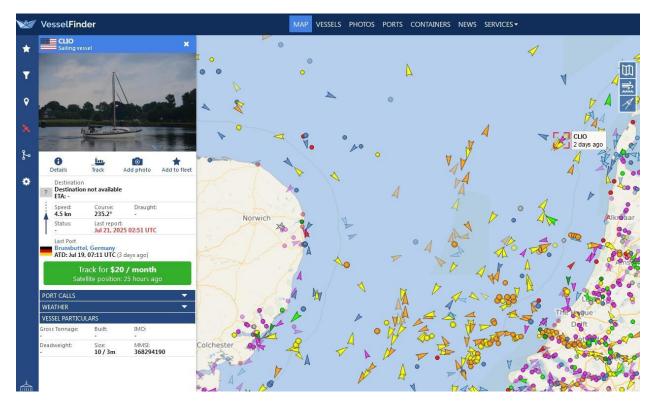
We've spent two overnights at sea so far and this will be two and hopefully three or four taking us to Dover and beyond.



Using a wind vane for self steering because we fried the Raymarine auto stick. Turns out as long as there is a wind you can steer the boat with the wind driven self-steering. After we get the Raymarine auto stick repaired we will only use it for glass like water.

Transferred fuel, filling the tank 8 gallons in reserve.

Two squalls passed over with max winds at 21 kts.



## **AIS Report**

Hi Tom,

so good to hear that you guys are doing fine. I must confess something. I was really concerned about the missing AIS reports. I send the map showing the last report position in the attachment.

Did you switch off your AIS on purpose or is it possibly faulty?

So I called MRCC Bremen and asked them to help locate you guys. They in turn asked the British Coastguard and JRCC Den Helder for assistance. The British Coastguard even called back by phone about details. A little later MRCC Bremen called me and told me the British Coastguard located you in Lowestoft. They said they could locate you through your Garmin device. Is that the satellite based device you were talking about?

I hope you don't mind my activities, it obviously was a bit of overreaction.

So maybe the coastguard will be contacting you when you appear back on AIS. I apologize in advance if this causes any inconvenience.

What is your next plan? Sailing into London or north or south of the British islands into the Atlantic?

At no time did we not get information about surrounding ships. We saw no change in the Garmin system.

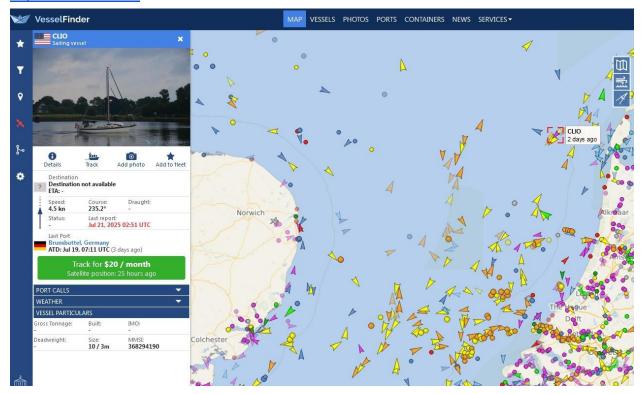
This anomaly has not been cured. I heard this effect from another follower so this is an important anomaly.

To wash clothes you take your clothes off and put them in the basin of the shower. Stomp on them as you shower.

Clothes

2 pair cotton shorts

2 pair of cotton boxers

1 pair light wool pants from thrift store suits

1 pair of heavy wool pants from thrift store suits

- 2 cotton T-shirts
- 1 wool beret
- 1 straw wide brim hat with lanyard, history has taught me never to wear a lanyard hat during violent maneuvers, you'll lose your hat!
- 1 pair light wool gloves
- 1 set of rain gear, I bought my first set in Saint John's Newfoundland while waiting for Fiona to dock. I had flown in late the night before. The shop did not have my size so I settled for a simple visitors to the oil rig suit for \$100. It's served me well, forever.
- 1 bathing suit
- 1 cotton short sleeve shirt
- 1 wool P coat
- 1 pair crocks
- 1 pair water boots
- 1 pair of rubber boat shoes
- 4 pair of socks, cotton, light wool, medium wool, heavy wool.
- 1 pair cotton pants
- 1 belt
- 10 cotton handkerchiefs
- My clothes stay on the boat. Just the hat, wind breaker, cotton pants, long sleeve cotton shirt and boat shoes come home with the fancy anchor socks.
- Everything is dried heavily in a machine and stored in a 6 mil plastic bag with a seal that us impregnable leaving the boat.

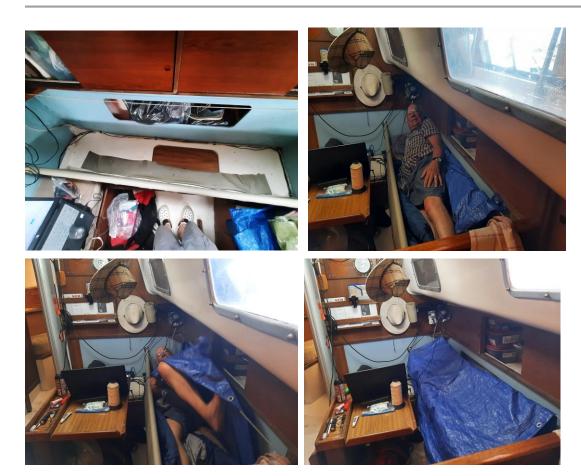
Saturday, July 26

Set up front cover, a methodical process of securing and protecting.

Retired Torquedo battery at 74% after three days of running, our dinghy motor for winter storage. It's best to cycle a lithium battery to 74% and since we do not use it, this was it's time to turn the planet.

Pumping antifreeze through engine, measuring stuffing box for exact wrenches. Willard spent hours cleaning the interior.

Fixed all the enclosure snaps and toggles, a chore left unattended for two years.



My bunk 18" x 80" x 6" med+ geri mattress, excellent, waterproof!

I do not mind being in the coffin, if anything, I enjoy it. While being violently tossed here and there you needed to be contained. The bunks on the Acushnet, Melville's sister ship, had bunks where the only way to sleep was in the fetal position. Your body latched on to all sides of the bunk holding you in solid place giving you rest. Even in the 18" coffin bunk, I still need to curl up to be held in place. In the other two bunks, the boys stick extra sleeping bags and pillows to hold them in place in a rolling ocean.

Just by chance, I ended up with the narrow bunk. Initially part of a bench around a large galley table, you could fit in two mattress extensions turning it into a double.

Outfitting for the voyage we needed three excellent bunks. One already in the cabin was 31" x 80". The V berth could hold a mattress like that but the other was 18" wide. We bought the state-of-the-art custom geri beds from the local do it all for the old people store. The 6" sealed mattress with additional custom cover is the only way to go.

Designed by my architect client in Atlanta. He made use of his knowledge building silos to make round buildings.

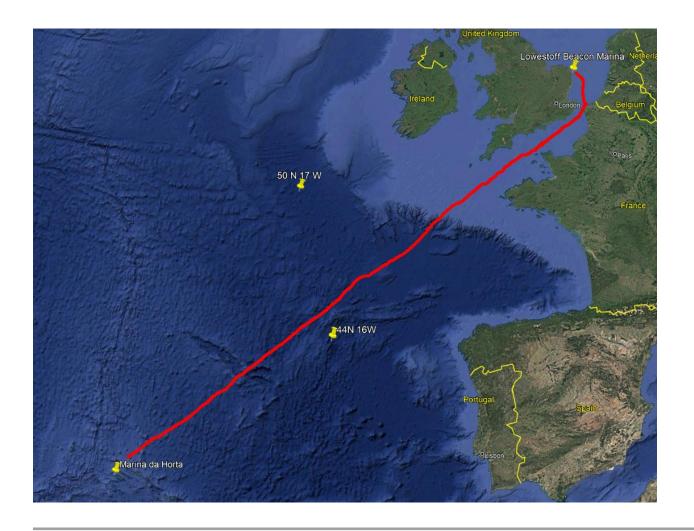
Having our morning beer and rightly so a breakfast stout!
